The Alamance Chamber, in partnership with Elon University's Center for Leadership and Alamance-Burlington Schools, welcomed one hundred and twenty 7th graders into this year's AYLA cohort. The new cohort arrived on Elon University's campus on Tuesday, June 18 to kick off their three-day Alamance Youth Leadership Academy (AYLA) orientation.

The summer program is designed to strengthen our youth's leadership skills as well as give them the opportunity to get acquainted with other program participants. A program favorite is the opportunity to take part in an outdoor challenge course experience where students were encouraged to demonstrate leadership skills and work together as a team. Throughout the week, students also participated in group activities, attended workshops that focused on diversity and public speaking, worked to develop a plan for their School Improvement Project, and heard from Burlington Mayor Ian Baltutis and Tracey Grayzer, President

of Impact Alamance. They wrapped up the week with a Closing Ceremony where they presented ideas for their School Improvement Projects to guests.

The summer program is just the beginning of the AYLA experience. AYLA students will spend the next two years meeting with their school's AYLA advisor for school-based chapter meetings, where students will discuss, plan, and implement their school improvement project. In addition to their school-based chapter meetings, each AYLA chapter will also attend joint events each program year to continue growing and strengthening their leadership skills. These joint events are facilitated by Leadership Fellows from Elon University's Center for Leadership. There are currently just over 200 students in 7th and 8th grade, from ten local middle schools, participating in AYLA. We look forward to watching these students grow as leaders in their schools, and ultimately in their community.

Triad Workforce Initiative
(ETWI). Alamance County
is part of a four-county
partnership along with
Guilford, Randolph and
Rockingham counties that
received an allocation in
the North Carolina State

apprenticeships and work experience training. The ETWI funds have been used for enhanced training materials, apprenticeship employment costs, promotion and exposure for the programs, events to expose students to skilled trades, and programs to educate teachers on local jobs and related necessary skills.

The latest significant

project is a new website just in time for fall recruiting. The new site is mobile responsive as most students will access on a mobile device, integrates a new digital application, and overall is more user friendly and informative. site will be launching early August.

At press time, a Phase II ETWI request is in the current state budget for \$4.5 million for each of the next two years to continue the work with the county apprenticeship programs, workforce development offices, plus adding in new programs for connecting veterans to jobs in the region.

Recently, I had a chance to visit the new Lotus Bakery facility under construction in Mebane. It has been two years since the Belgium-based producer of Biscoff cookies (known as "the airline cookie"), announced plans to construct its first US-based production facility.

After a year of facility planning and another year of constructing, it is now close to opening. During the tour, they were testing one of the equipment lines to be used in baking and packaging the cookies. It was fascinating.

We saw the area where the production starts as raw material, then is brought into the facility, and through a complex system of piping and machinery, is mixed to make the cookie dough. From there, it is transported to the ovens, and progresses through a series of temperatures, where the dough is transformed into cookies.

Afterwards, the cookies go to another system of machines that handle the packaging of the baked cookies.

While I am proud to have Lotus and their facility here, and I love the cookies, this piece isn't about either Lotus or the cookies. It is about commitment to excellence.

I found myself taking in all the investment by the company and all the work by the employees and using all the available and proprietary food science knowledge to produce.... a cookie no, actually, millions of them, and all exactly the same. Everybody and everything in the facility was committed

to that goal of excellence in product quality.

Lotus is not unique in that goal. Businesses of all types and sizes are also committed to product or service excellence. They do not survive if they are not.



18TH ANNUAL CLASSROOM COLLECTION RUNS THROUGH AUGUST 12

Approximately 54% of students enrolled in Alamance-Burlington Schools receive free or reduced meals. Last year's campaign brought in nearly 35,000 school supplies and helped over 3,100 students. Each month (with the exception of July and November) the Education Council meets at the Alamance Chamber to hear from a guest speaker as well as discuss programs, events, and initiatives that look to advance local education. This forum is a benefit of chamber membership and encourages business leaders to be actively involved in education and school leaders to examine the needs of the business community.

Most recently the council had the opportunity to hear from NC Education Lottery representatives, Van Denton, Director of Corporate Communications, and Hayden Bauguess, Director of Government Relations. Van and Hayden shared the history of the North Carolina Lottery earnings which shows substantial growth since its inception in 2006. The council also learned the break down of how each dollar spent on the lottery is used. Over seven-hundred million dollars has been budgeted to go back

into North Carolina schools in 2019. This funding will cover non-instructional support, school construction, prekindergarten, lottery scholarships, LEA (local education agencies) transportation, and UNC needbased financial aid.

We know that the lottery funding is statewide, but a portion of the funds have directly impacted many of our schools in Alamance County. Among other projects, funds have been used to provide additional classroom space, repair roofs, remove asbestos, and add wheelchair ramps at multiple schools in our county. The improved accessibility, plus safer and more adequate learning environments, is an integral part in the school improvement process.
